A world without VIA is hard to imagine.

Without VIA, I would not be where I am and who I am today. I believe the same could be said for most people who have gone through a VIA program. My VIA experience on the American Language & Culture (ALC) program was the core reason for me to pursue a grad-

uate degree and a career in the U.S. Through conversations with our alumni, I have heard many of them share similar stories of how their VIA experiences opened new doors and shaped their career paths. It is also amazing to hear from many of them that their personal lives had been changed by meeting their life-long partners through a VIA program. I have had the honor to attend a few VIA weddings and look forward to more in the years to come.

The following pages illustrate our activities from July 2015 to June 2016 when we ran 17 programs in Asia and the U.S. and impacted the lives of over 400 individuals. As we are being increasingly intentional about how we align our program offerings in Asia and the U.S. to build an ecosystem of changemakers, we are hearing more stories in which people embark on a journey with VIA beyond their initial program experience. Some of these stories are introduced in this report including a former Japanese participant who returned to our social innovation program as a student coordinator to guide new students and build his leadership skills. We are also starting to see a growing number of VIA alumni who are passing the torch to their children to join VIA as second-generation fellows or participants.

I am extremely humbled and privileged to steward VIA during a period of great opportunity to bring deeper impact to the people we serve and be a part of their VIA journeys. The VIA staff and board are also feeling greater importance in the work we do especially at a time with increasing tension and conflicts around the world. Tim & Mia Clark


(Indonesia 1972, former Board member, Interim Executive Director 2011)

VIA expanded its portfolio of youth programs and brought 18 youth and three adult mentors to Hong Kong and Guangzhou for the innagural American Youth Leadership Program (AYLP). The group spent three weeks learning about leadership, environmental issues, sustainable development, and Chinese language and culture.

Seven Stanford students joined VIA in Yogyakarta, Indonesia during summer 2015 for internships at community development NGOs. The program was designed in partnership with the Haas Center for Public Service at Stanford and matched American students with a cohort of Indonesian students. Graduating senior and trip leader Sanchay Gupta interned at the public health organization Griya Pemulihan Siloam (GPS).

Har Khaw Dee

During summer 2015 VIA brought several participants to San Francisco from Myanmar to join our Exploring Social Innovation (ESI) Program. Har Khaw Dee shared her passion for education as a Warden at the Phaung Daw Oo Monastic School (PDO) where she supports 186 girls from different regions in Myanmar, some of them even coming from areas of civil war. Although many of these girls age 5-16 are struggling with poverty and loss of confidence, Khaw Dee sees their potential and is dedicated to seeing them grow fully into themselves and achieve all that they're capable of. During ESI, Khaw Dee shared her own story of why she chose her career path to the group of changemakers across Asia during the

ESI tradition event, V-talks--the V stands for VIA, and is originally inspired by the famed TED talks. She planned to reuse this V-Talk format to encourage her girls to share their stories with her and each other. She is calling this the "You & Me" program, which will start with her 9th grade girls, and be held every Sunday evening, where each girl will have a chance to share about their families, challenges, views and other aspects of themselves that they've been a bit shy to reveal so far.







