VIA Enters 2023 in Anticipation of 60th Anniversary

HIGHLIGHTS Rikuzen Takata Project

This past summer, VIA resumed our in-person programming with the Rikuzen Takata Project. In partnership with Rikkyo University, students from the US, Japan, and Hong Kong were invited to participate in a seven-day joint program dedicated to understanding disaster recovery and working with the community in Rikuzen Takata, a city that was devastated by the 2011 Tohoku earthquake and tsunami.

This special program, which began its collaboration in 2015, was led by VIA Program Director Yuki Ueda and **Rikkyo University Professor** Akiko Takai, who also serves as the Deputy General of Save the Children Japan.

With a shared agenda on the United Nations' Global Goals for Sustainable Development (SDGs), the participants connected with the Rikuzen Takata

community through immersive team activities, workshops with guest speakers, and site visits to areas that were still affected by the 2011 events.



VIA MOMENT

The Rikuzen Takata Project was my first in-person program in about three years. I was a bit nervous about leading a group of students in an area that I was unfamiliar with. These are, of course, the same anxieties that our participants had as well. So I told myself what I told them: it's natural to be nervous, and don't get caught up in the mistakes that you will eventually make; focus on the ways that we will grow and learn. One of our participants reflected on how he was often outcasted at school, but that he felt welcomed and celebrated for his lovely uniqueness at VIA. Although he had always been secure in his own identity and convictions, what he was missing was a community of "his people" where he felt he could belong. His experience resonated with me so deeply, because that has been my own experience within the VIA community - a place accepting of people who have always been told they are misfits. I'm grateful to have found VIA before I believed that narrative too deeply!

Next30 Central Asia Program with Meridian International Center

Throughout the summer, VIA collaborated with Meridian International Center to host young leaders from Central Asia who were part of the US State Department sponsored **Next30 Program.**

The Next30 Program brought three cohorts of emerging leaders from Central Asia to the US on a study tour to share their accomplishments, success stories, and contributions and identify their vision for the future of Central Asia. The participants included innovators and experts from Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, and Turkmenistan in the fields of business, media, culture, technology, and civil society.

Cultural exchanges are a powerful way to connect people and build mutual respect between countries. Programs like Next30 are crucial diplomatic tools that increase crosscultural understanding and demonstrate shared values, creating space for discussion and dialogue between different countries and cultures. During the portion of their visit hosted by VIA, the participants had an opportunity to explore Silicon Valley through a series of discussion seminars, educational workshops, and immersive hands-on experiences.

"I'm thankful for how this fellowship has granted me abundant time in a spacious, beautiful home in a warm community and the freedom to plan, experiment, and reflect in my life works. I've continued hosting the workshops in city library that use various arts (recently scriptwriting, improv, songwriting) to promote expression, confidence, communication, and English practice. I also worked with a local arts studio/atelier Atorie Subaru in their Utsuwa Marche, a yearly arts event targeted to open up creative experiences for local mothers and their children.



I hosted a workshop that used collage to decorate mirrors, with the concept of repurposing existing elements and envisioning oneself within nature.

I've also been collaborating with a local food company, Glow Foods, to organize a mural painting event in December for their new containers, with a focus on making mural-painting activities accessible to children, seniors, and disabled participants.

Nevertheless, from my time here I have taken away an invaluable insight that all communities I belong to and join are constantly connecting and growing and that there are unlimited ways to combine personally meaningful individual specialties with others in the community to form collective visions and vibrant movements. I feel confident in my developed ability to weave such collaborations between the international communities I belong to in future pursuits."

Updates from Ryan, VIA ACCL Social Impact Leader





Ryan Chan Pyae Kyaw Founder of Sone See Yar Academy, Myanmar

Sone See Yar Academy is an educational platform that allows university students in Myanmar to continue their education using technology at a low cost, as well as technical support for teachers who want to start their own online classes. Sone See Yar Academy launched just before the COVID-19 pandemic but due to economic and political instability, the academy shifted to an online platform so it would be more accessible for Burmese students, and for teachers and professors to earn extra income by applying their knowledge and skills in creating their own online courses.

Sone See Yar Academy will enable CDM (Civil Disobedience Movement) students to continue their education with the aid of technology at an affordable price. This project will provide a platform and technical assistance where teachers can get a chance to open their own online classes on our platform.

In the next 12 months, we are planning to open up to 20 classes for more than

1,800 students, while offering teaching positions for more than 30 teachers to join our platforms. In addition, we are planning to organize at least 10 events in 6 months and training workshops for both youths and teachers to educate them on today's global trending topics, to promote self-study, and self-learning strategies for Burmese students.
