From the Executive Director, Kazutoh Ishida

As we celebrate our 60th anniversary, we have been reflecting on our identity and clarifying our purpose in today's world. With the guidance of a task force comprised of VIA staff and board members, we explored how to maintain VIA's core values while adapting to a changing world. After over a year of deep discussions and gathering perspectives from our community, the task force developed a vision statement and a renewed mission statement to guide VIA over the years to come. We are grateful for the support and feedback provided by alumni and partners during this process. I am proud to present our new vision and mission statements here:

VISION: We envision a global community of leaders collaborating across boundaries to build a more compassionate society and to address critical social challenges.

MISSION: Through Asia and US-based experiential learning opportunities that encompass self-reflection, creative problemsolving, and cross-cultural connection, VIA equips emerging social impact leaders with skill sets and mindsets to address complex human challenges. Guided by these statements, all our activities and programs — whether shortterm or long-term, or in-person or virtual — will focus on inspiring



emerging social impact leaders who can balance tangible leadership skills needed to create actionable change in their communities with a mindset of humility, curiosity, and compassion.

THIS SUMMER at VIA!

It was a jam-packed summer at VIA! This year, VIA hosted seven programs in the US and Asia including our Exploring Social Innovation (ESI) and Exploring Health Care (EHC) programs, along with our custom programs in partnership with the Masason Foundation, Fukuoka Futaba High School, Curio School, and Rikkyo University. Over 60 participants had the opportunity to join VIA this summer for a unique and unforgettable experience of social impact and innovation training!

Exploring Social Innovation (ESI) Program

The ESI program welcomed participants from Hong Kong, China, Vietnam, Japan, Myanmar, and Thailand for a week of experiential learning through social innoavation with visits to visits to Google and Stanford and workshops by local leaders in social impact and social enterprises in the Bay Area.







Exploring Health Care (EHC) Program

The EHC program invited medical students from Japan, Korea, and Zambia to Silicon Valley for two weeks to explore a wide variety of health related topics, including organ transplantation and palliative care. Participants also joined visits and lectures at the Stanford Medical Center, volunteered at local community centers, and examined social and cultural challenges in health care through discussions and reflection activities.

Masason Foundation

The Masason Foundation in Tokyo supports youth with high aspirations and exceptional talents to develop their skills, and contribute to the future of humankind. This summer, young leaders from ages 8 - 19 joined VIA as part of their North America Summer Program to learn about Silicon Valley's hub of global innovation, highlighted with a guest lecture from Dr. Richard Dasher, Director of the US-Asia Technology Management Center at Stanford and a visit to UC Berkeley.





Fukuoka Futaba High School

We enjoyed our fifth year welcoming students from Fukuoka Futaba High School to Silicon Valley. Students joined the ESI program participants in an innovator's mindset scavenger hunt activity and a design-thinking workshop. They also met with a Japanese social innovator and visited social enterprises addressing critical social issues.





Curio School

We hosted six Japanese university students from Curio School, an educational company in Tokyo that promotes creativity through designthinking, for a week-long exploratory program in Silicon Valley. The students had an opportunity to visit sites including Plug and Play Tech Center and the Intel Museum, and engaged in a conversation with an engineer at Apple. They also enjoyed an evening watching an exciting major league baseball game at Oracle Park in San Francisco.

Rikuzen Takata Project (Japan)

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During this 8-day program facilitated with the Rikkyo University's Center for Global Human Resource Development, participants from Japan, Hong Kong, and the US learned from public and private sector leaders and community members as they visited Tokyo and Rikuzen Takata, a rural Japanese community that has been named an SDG model city for their efforts to bring their community together after the 2011 Great East Japan Earthquake.

Sophie Brown

BEAM Education Foundation – Chiang Mai, Thailand

Sophie grew up outside Philadelphia and attended Washington University in St. Louis, majoring in Anthropology and Biology, to better



understand the evolution of human behavior by coupling ordinarily separate biological and cultural perspectives. Sophie has worked in healthcare in St. Louis and a medical clinic in Cusco, Peru providing the local population with personalized and quality care. Through these experiences, she began to understand the power of cross-cultural relationships and connecting with individuals despite language or cultural barriers.

This motivated her to seek further global connections in Asia, where she currently enjoys working as a Program Associate and GED Reasoning Through Language Arts Instructor at BEAM to gain a greater understanding of cultural identities in Thailand. Joining the Compulsory Education Program team, Sophie also supports their Community Youth Leadership Development (CYLD) program whose vision is to produce emotionally healthy, communityserving, and globally-minded young migrant leaders ready to pursue higher education opportunities.

Anny Lin

Parami University - Chiang Mai, Thailand

Raised in China during her early years, Anny immigrated to Vermont at the age of five. She spent her childhood navigating the intricacies of being a daughter of immigrants, an ESL



student, and a Chinese-American girl living in predominantly white, English-speaking spaces. These early experiences fostered her hopes for creating social change through crosscultural learning and connection-building.

Anny received a BA in International Affairs from George Washington University (GWU), becoming the first university graduate in her family. At GWU, Anny took a course on equitable development in Southeast Asia, which led her to complete her senior thesis focused on the well-being of Rohingya refugee teachers in Bangladesh. Anny was also involved with First Gen United, where she supported first-generation college students through mentorship and advocacy, while completing a fellowship with Global Campaign for Education-US, where she supported advocacy strategies to bolster support for international basic education programs.

As a Program Progression Advisor at Parami University, Anny provides support to university students regarding their academic plans, career goals, and assists students in meeting their graduation requirements, as well as provides tutoring service on an appointment basis. Through her VIA Fellowship, she is looking forward to expanding her understanding of Burmese and Thai languages, histories, and cultures.

Brooke Taffler

Parami University - Chiang Mai, Thailand

Brooke grew up in Connecticut and received her BA in Public Health from Syracuse University. During her studies, she found her passion for improving global health and well-being. At Syracuse, Brooke worked with local organizations that empower and engage with refugee communities. Brooke also studied in India, expanding



her global health knowledge with first-hand experiences in new social contexts. She deeply values building connections and sharing experiences with others and hopes to continue exploring outside of her comfort zone.

At Parami, Brooke supports Burmese students seeking US-accredited bachelor's degrees and helps provide opportunities for Myanmar youth to develop the necessary skills to be change agents in their communities. She is excited to learn from the community as well as sharing her own knowledge. Brooke recognizes the importance of education in breaking generational cycles that are challenging to escape and is eager to empower students to explore their interests and acquire new skills to forge their own unique paths.
