


Website Redesign

ince 2019, VIA has embarked on a transformative journey to refresh our identity, aligning it with our latest strategic plan and recognizing the need for a more cohesive and effective online presence. This initiative gained momentum in 2022 when staff and board members formed a dedicated task force to craft new vision and mission statements. With invaluable input from our community and the expertise through a partnership with MediaCause, a nonprofit marketing agency, we unveiled revitalized statements during VIA's 60th anniversary celebration—an event that symbolized both reflection and renewal.

We focused on developing a cohesive brand identity and voice to guide the website redesign. By fall 2023, we had clearly defined the site's purpose, design, and functionality. The construction phase unfolded over the summer and fall, resulting in a streamlined, user-friendly experience. Key improvements emphasize VIA's story, showcasing our identity and community. While the previous site highlighted our activities, the new platform centers on who we are and

Via's Summer Highlights

This summer, VIA welcomed over 50 participants from around the world to its summer programs in Asia and the US, promoting cross-cultural exchange and nurturing the next generation of social impact leaders.



Exploring Social Innovation and Health Care!



VIA's Exploring Social Innovation (ESI) and Exploring Health Care (EHC) programs welcomed students from across Asia, including Japan, Hong Kong, Thailand, the Philippines, Taiwan, China, and Myanmar, for an immersive experience in the

San Francisco Bay Area. Participants in both programs learned and practiced design-thinking, while addressing personal and social issues they were passionate about. Both programs were filled with highlights such as visits to Stanford University, UC Berkeley, Delancey Street Foundation, NVIDIA, JP Morgan, Google, and volunteering at Project Open Hand. The ESI program featured interactive workshops, group discussions, and insights from local leaders and changemakers, all aimed at discovering new possibilities for creating a better world. Meanwhile, medical students joining the EHC program explored a wide range of healthcare topics—from organ transplantation and palliative care to public health—while examining social and cultural challenges through the lens of healthcare.



Exploring Silicon Valley with Fukuoka Futaba High School

This summer, VIA welcomed students from Fukuoka Futaba High School as part of our Exploring Silicon Valley (ESV) program for an enriching experience focused on culture, innovation, and leadership development. Highlights of their visit included exploring Glide Memorial Church in San Francisco, attending an Oakland A's vs. Dodgers game, learning about the Japanese American history at the Japanese American Museum of San Jose, and touring the Stanford campus alongside participants from our Exploring Social Innovation (ESI) program. Since 2016, VIA has partnered with Futaba High School to bring students to Silicon Valley for experiential learning, and in 2024, VIA launched the Nichibei Girls Collaborative—a seven-month cultural exchange and social impact leadership program for female-identifying high school students from Futaba High School and two high schools in Salinas, California.



Rikuzentakata Project

In August, US university students participated in VIA's annual seven-day project-based learning program alongside students from Rikkyo University in Tokyo and The University of Hong Kong, focusing on the city of Rikuzentakata, which was devastated by the 2011 earthquake and tsunami. Through quest speakers, site visits, immersive activities, and collaborative team projects, participants explored the community's recovery journey and its vision for a sustainable future, discussing the United Nations' Global Goals for Sustainable Development (SDGs). This experiential learning opportunity allowed them to deepen their understanding of social issues in rural Japan through the lens of disaster recovery, develop a global perspective on community resilience, and explore the application of SDG 11: Sustainable Cities and Communities in diverse contexts. Ultimately, the program fostered connections among VIA participants from the US, Japan, and Hong Kong.



Welcoming Parami University Students to the Bay Area!

This summer, VIA welcomed nine Parami University students to the Bay

Area after they wrapped up their summer internships in Washington DC. Parami University, a liberal arts institution for Burmese students, is a valued partner for VIA's Global Community Fellowship. Generous VIA alumni hosted the students in their homes, enriching their experience.

Led by VIA Executive Director Kazutoh Ishida, the students explored highlights of the Bay Area, including a visit to Stanford University. A special reception organized by Parami President Kyaw Moe Tun brought together supporters of Burmese education, including VIA alumni, former board members, and VIA founder Dwight Clark. This gathering allowed the students to meet Dwight and share their experiences and meaningful stories together.

This year, VIA's Fall Study Tour took participants on an enriching journey through Japan, uniting alumni from various decades of our organization's history. Led by VIA Executive Director Kazutoh Ishida, the tour kicked off in the enchanting city of Kyoto, where attendees immersed themselves in its rich cultural heritage by visiting breathtaking shrines and temples. The adventure continued in
